#### **President's Message**

Summer 2018 is well and truly here. The cheerful weather provided me a moment of courage to drop by unannounced at 106 Brock St., known to many as the "Stephen Merrick" house.

Gail and Bill Ellison, who purchased the home in August 2017, are two of MDHS' newer members but their enthusiasm for restoration will be familiar to many MDHS members who have been custodians of other heritage homes in Merrickville-Wolford. Bill and Gail (and faithful canine companion Winston), are using Bill's antique refinishing skills and background in Fine Arts to their advantage as the process of restoring both the interior and exterior of the house unfolds. Gail's research skills have allowed her to create an illustrated book highlighting stories of the house and its occupants.

The day I visited, the recently restored fountain, built by Copps Bros. in Hamilton, ON in 1873, was running in the back yard – rescued by Gail and Bill from its previous life as a planter. It is inspiring to meet members who are willing to share their skills, knowledge and enthusiasm, and I'm hoping to "rope them in" to provide us with some restoration updates and stories in the future. Recognizing new members (and we have had a number of new members in the last year or so – welcome all!) is always a happy occasion, especially when we have to say goodbye to others. It is with sadness that I was informed of the death of one of our life members, Dr. Gordon Armstrong on June 24, 2018 in Ottawa. Many of you will remember Gordon and his wife Molly and other are undoubtedly familiar with their stone house, Gilnockie, on River Rd. between Merrickville and Burritt's Rapids.

### **Merrickville-Wolford Threads of Life**



On **Wednesday, August 8** MDHS invites its members and supporters, residents of Merrickville-Wolford, and local businesses to join us in creating this exciting interactive exhibit. #### **The History Buffs**

As part of Merrickville-Wolford 225 Celebrations, Holy Trinity Anglican Church is partnering with the Merrickville and District Historical Society to present "The History Buffs," a trio of musicians from the Ottawa valley who combine traditional music with storytelling to create family-friendly entertainment.

### **September Lecture**

The infamous Great Lakes gale of November 1913 sunk freighters and took the lives of more than 250 people. Bruce Kemp, recently arrived in Merrickville and member of the MDHS, has published *Weather Bomb 1913: Life and Death on the Great Lakes*. Bruce's research, done over 40 years, led him to captains, sailors, meteorologists, contemporary news reports, interviews with survivors, and archives.


Bruce Kemp will share his journey with us as part of our regular lecture series at the Merrickville Legion on **September 25, 2018 at 2 PM.** 



### **OUR MEMBERS**


Victor Suthren, past director of the Canadian War Museum, is an established writer and historian with a special interest in maritime history. Victor as published several works including *The Island of Canada, To Go Upon Discovery,* and *The Sea Has No End.* On Saturday, August 4 2018 at 2 PM Victor will be launching his latest work, *Black Flag of the North:*Bartholomew Roberts, King of Atlantic Pirates, at the Merrickville Public Library. This book explores the history of the "King of Pirates", Bartholomew Roberts, who took over four hundred ships. Victor's book follows the Pirate King through his incredible journey from South Wales to Brazil.





An award-winning photographer and writer, **Bruce Kemp** and his wife, Laurie Carter, have recently moved to Merrickville from the Okanagan Valley. Bruce's works include *The Complete Travel Writer*, the *Ports Cruising Guide to Lake Erie and Lake St. Clair*, and the 2006 update to the Ports Cruising Guide to the Rideau Canal. Bruce has also written a historical novel, *Letters From A Fugitive Son*. Bruce's latest work is *Weather Bomb 1913: Life and Death on the Great Lakes*. Woven together from contemporary newspaper and courtroom reports along with eyewitness testimony gathered by Bruce from survivors, the book recounts the dreadful hurricane that swept across the Great Lakes in November of 1913.

Laurie Carter is an award-winning writer and photographer who is well known in Merrickville as the author of *Emily Carr's B.C.* (Book One and Two). Recently arrived in Merrickville with her husband, Bruce Kemp, Laurie is a journalist, author, and blogger and has presented lectures on Emily Carr and the First Nations in BC for MDHS twice in the past year. Laurie's bibliography includes *Grandma Wears Hiking Boots: A personal guide to the Okanagan Valley* and *Gifts of the Okanagan* (a collaboration with Bruce Kemp). We look forward to hearing more from Laurie in the future.

Part of this project included participating in the Canadian Association for Conservation of Cultural Property and the Canadian Association of Professional Conservators' Care of Collections Survey, which collects data from museums across Canada to be used in deciding governmental priorities and budgeting.

All of these tasks are meant to help MDHS maintain its relevance for Merrickville-Wolford and the surrounding areas, building on community partnerships and recognizing the importance of local stakeholders. MDHS is an organization built for and supported by its community, and I am honored to be part of it. I look forward to working with you all in the coming months.
